Nuffield Scholars Meet in Cuba



Scholars and guests from across Canada as well as Alan and Anne Becket of England and Campbell and Isobel Tweed of Ireland used Cuba as their base for a learning experience as well as the site for the annual general meeting.

The group stayed at San Antonio del Banos, about an hour out of Havana. It was a typical Cuban resort frequented by the locals. The showers had solar heated water and the beds sun dried linens. Hotel meals,

predominantly starch and beans and chicken, with plenty of fruit, were consumed as we shared stories and created new friendships.

Our hosts, Glenn and Leta Ells had arranged several outings for the group. Humor needs no language and we all enjoyed the tour of the Museo del Humor. The visit to Bosque Martino del Ariguanabo, a dump turned conservation area, reminded us all of what one person with a passion and commitment can accomplish. Visits to some of the local families made many of us appreciate the rights and freedoms that we often take for granted. During the tour of Havana, you could see the contrast in architecture from the Moorish buildings of the 1700's to the lavish homes of the early 1900's to the Russian influenced buildings of the 1960's. Everywhere we went we saw classic cars and trucks, imported before the revolution.

In Cuba, farms are slowly coming back into the hands of the people and the farmers have united to form cooperatives. After government has taken their share of the crop, the group is able to sell the remainder. John Lohr, Nuffield '97 and his partners in Nova Scotia are working with one group to produce squash for them. We toured their fields of plantain, naranga, black beans, squash, and cassava as well as the packing shed.

All enjoyed the warmth and sunshine on a February day whether walking on the Malecon, Havana's seaside promenade or bathing in the crystal blue Caribbean or playing water games in the hotel pool.

Nuffielder Receives Order of Canada by John Lohr

On Feb 22 2008, Nuffield Scholar **Fred Walsh** received the Order of Canada from Governor General Michelle Jean. The award was given for a lifetime of conspicuous



community service. Fred was the Dept of Ag extension rep in Kings County, Nova Scotia for many years. He assisted and counseled many a farmer through life's problems. He is famous for a lifetime of near perfect recall of names and relatives. Fred lost his sight in one eye in a farm accident in 1960. As a result, he made the CNIB and farm safety a life passion. He continues to be active in Rotary, winning many awards for his contribution to the life of his club, Kentville Rotary. Fred is always quick to recognize the contribution to his success made by his wife Mary and is very proud of his six children. Fred has two sons, Waldo and Michael, to whom he has passed on his passion for apple farming and they now have farms next door to each other. As a very wise and experienced Ag rep, he felt each should have his own operation. Fred is an avid gardener and has a large garden, which threatens by times to overwhelm him. He has the wonderful practice of planting trees to mark special events. Therefore, the birth of a grandchild will occasion the planting of a tree and later the placing of a small plaque to commemorate the event. Fred planted a honey locus 50 years ago upon the arrival of my parents to Canada as they started their life in Canada working for Fred's father Waldo, then deputy Minister of Agriculture. There is also a blue spruce planted to commemorate Terry Fox and 10 cedars commemorating the 10 provinces. Fred is quick to credit the impact of the Nuffield Scholarship upon his life. "It was a great opportunity and I met so many wonderful people". Fred was away from home for 6 months and accomplished that rare Nuffield event of missing the birth of a child...in this case # 4

Waldo. Fred was most impressed by the sensible land use planning in the UK. "Agricultural land had been protected by zoning for 300 years. I brought that back and later sat on county council and had the support of the Dept of Agriculture and farmers to see Kings County adopt agricultural zoning bylaws". Fred saw many new agricultural ideas and helped introduce them into Nova Scotia.

Fred and his family have had a big impact in my family's life. I can say from personal experience that his greatest accomplishment is that, those who know him the best, love and appreciate him the most. *Well-done Fred, and thanks so much.*

We made a decision to run with part of the marketing plan that was presented to us last year by Iris Meck. The whole thing is going a little slower than I had anticipated, but the work that I have seen so far is excellent. It will be great exposure for us if the agriculture papers decide to

From Dec. 28 / 2007 – Apr. 3 / 2008 I traveled with my family through Argentina and Chile for the purpose of my individual study on the symbiotic relationship between soil biology and plants. Making a home base in a beach town in Argentina and later the Lake District in Chile I was able to travel to various farms and agricultural plants while my family enjoyed the attractions the country had to offer. Jill Clapperton, a prominent Canadian rhizosphere ecologist, provided my initial contacts. These contacts were then useful in developing a further list of resources. I was impressed with each of my visits. All were knowledgeable hospitable people who are enthusiastic about the future of soil microbes. In addition to enriching my knowledge and spirit in soil biology, the experience and bonding I shared with my lovely wife and children was a once in a life time opportunity and we will cherish our memories for years to come.

The highlights of my study experience include visiting Cesar Belloso member of the no-till farmers of Argentina and a popular speaker on the subject around the world and Carlos Crovetto in Chile, known as the grandfather of no-till farming, who wrote two books on the subject.
